Being Clothed with Christ

Like many Catholic little boys, Scotty Hetrick wanted to be a priest. The idea came and went at various times throughout childhood, but when he was in high school and witnessed people close to him actually losing their Catholic Faith, the desire to work to save souls became compelling. Scott is now in his second year at St. Thomas Aquinas Semi-

nary in Dillwyn, VA and thriving in the disciplined, religious environment there.

Scott is the latest in a long line of St. Joseph's students who have been generous enough to try their vocation at St. Thomas Aquinas Seminary. Surely, a calling to the priesthood comes from God Himself, but we are grateful that St. Joseph's Academy has been able to play a part in so many priestly and religious vocations. We work hard to provide a faith-filled environment and the academic rigor necessary for the seeds of faith to sprout in the lives of the fathers and mothers and the priests and religious of tomorrow.

Scott Hetrick literally grew up around St. Joseph's Academy. His mother has served as the school Administrator and as a teacher of both History and Math for decades. All of the Hetrick children have attended the Academy, and serving Mass and singing in the choir are as natural to Scott and his brothers as breathing.

This fall, Scott Hetrick was privileged to take a major step towards the priesthood. On October 7, 2020, The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, 19 seminarians made their first visible offering of themselves by embracing the habit of the Roman clergy. It is often said that the cassock is a sermon in itself. It is a profession of faith, a sign of hope, and an unmistakable witness of Our Lord Jesus Christ and His Church. In our times when the message of Christ is being aggressively suppressed, the presence of the cassock is all the more necessary,


both for those who witness it and those who wear it.

Although the cassock is typically received on February 2, The Feast of the Purification, this year the ceremony was shifted to October. The occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Society of Saint Pius X led to a decision to have 2nd year seminarians take this important step a few months earlier, to allow for them to be in cassock for the ceremonies and pilgrimages surrounding the solemn occasion. Whatever the reason, Scott Hetrick and his 18 classmates were thrilled to take this step earlier than expected.

Although the seminary is more than 11 hours away from his home in

Michigan, Scott's family made the trip for the ceremony. His mother, father, grandmother, and three of his five siblings made the drive and were there in the seminary chapel when those 19 young men entered, carrying their cassocks over one arm. Father LeRoux, the seminary Rector, gave a stirring sermon on the blessings and obligations of the cassock, and just minutes later, those 19 young men returned to the church looking very much like the priests they hope to become someday.

After the Mass, all present participated in a beautiful Rosary








procession where different versions of the "Ave Maria" were sung in turn, consecrating the day to Our Lady. The weather, true to Virginia in October, was absolutely beautiful—perfect for the photos taken outdoors before the celebratory banquet in the seminary refectory. Mrs. Hetrick reflected that seeing her son in a cassock and seeing his generosity in making sacrifices to help others save their souls was a deeply moving experience. She gives thanks to God for giving such graces to her son and begs God and Our Lady to protect him, help him to see truth and fight error, and become a truly saintly priest. Following this memorable weekend, we pray that this is just the first of many steps toward the lofty goal of the priesthood of Our Lord Jesus Christ for this generous young man.







A Gilded and Glorious Jubilee

November 1, 1970 marked the birth of the Society of Saint Pius X and the last great work of its founder, Archbishop Lefebvre. From its humble beginnings, the Society has brought forth generations of priests, religious, and lay folk who have flown the flag of Tradition in our increasingly godless world. This November, we celebrated a gilded and glorious jubilee of this Society which, despite growing pains and battle wounds, has not

lost its luster and vitality. To commemorate the anniversary, the students at St. Joseph's Academy pulled out all the stops with a full three days of celebration.

On Tuesday, November 3, all SJA students participated in scavenger hunts focusing on the history of the SSPX and the life of its Founder. Later in the day, the 5th through 8th graders broke up into their house teams and worked on large display boards detailing the three main periods in the life of Archbishop Lefebvre: his childhood, his seminary and priestly life, and the founding and growth of the Society. Meanwhile, another group of students prepared a large timeline of the SSPX.

On the following days, the older students watched a video on the life of the Archbishop while the younger students in grades K-4 learned about our beloved Founder through age-appropriate talks given by Father Kimball. Regardless of the medium of communication, everyone was inspired and edified to learn the details of the life of this remarkable, saintly man.

Throughout the week, each grade

was given facts about the Society, the Archbishop, and the crisis in the Church to study in preparation for a school-wide quiz game held on Thursday afternoon. Evidently, the students took the challenge seriously and were so well-versed on the topic that Father Kimball had a hard time getting any of the house teams to miss a point! Ultimately, Kateri House emerged as the winner, with


points going towards a total for the whole three-day event.

It was a unique and treasured opportunity for the children, many of whom have never known what it is like to have to travel hours to find a traditional Latin Mass. They were able to see just how lucky they are to be enjoying the fruit of decades of labor by the SSPX, and how important it is for them, in turn, to carry the torch forward and honor the memory of our saintly Archbishop.


